Dear Parents and Caregivers,

Quality Catholic Education School Review (QCESR)

As I mentioned in the previous newsletter, we had a QCESR process at our school last week which involved a panel of 4 delegates from CEWA spending 3 days in our community analysing the processes in the school and seeking feedback from staff, students, parents and Fr Pavol, our parish priest on their thoughts about the direction the school is moving in and how it is being managed.

NAPLAN

We received the NAPLAN results last week which was a good opportunity for us to compare an external assessment across a range of areas with our own school assessments to consolidate our understanding each child's progress across the core areas of English and Maths. Parents of Year 3 and 5 students have just received hard copies of these results, as usual, if parents would like to discuss the results, please do not hesitate to catch up with their child's class teacher or myself.

NAIDOC Day focus

We had a wonderful day in the community on Friday, 28 July focussing on NAIDOC day. The day began with a whole school liturgy, led by Fr Pavol, related to our focus before a number of people with connections to our community spend time with the children knowledge and understanding of different aspects of the Aboriginal culture which gave a great insight for our children. Some of these activities included: cooking damper, finding out about medicinal plants, Aboriginal dance, traditional Aboriginal food etc

Basketball/Netball Court Line markings

We have had some concerns over the past few weeks about the deterioration of the line markings on the newly refurbished basketball/netball court. I have been in touch with the company who did the painting who have indicated they will re-paint the courts, free of charge, over the upcoming school holiday break. Apologies to the basketball and netball clubs for any inconvenience caused, we will rectify this problem as soon as we can.

Performing Arts festival update

Our Year 6 class kicked off the 2023 Performing Arts campaign in style last Thursday with a great percussion performance at Trinity College, congratulations to Diana Newman and the Year 6's for a great performance. We had some piano soloists perform last week too and our Year 1 and 2 classes performed their Choral Speaking items today, congratulations again to all children involved.

GSK Farmer's Markets

A new innovation at our school will be the GSK Farmer's Markets which will be held periodically, an opportunity for us to make available to the broader community, some of our produce: chicken eggs, quail eggs, worm tea and produce from our herb garden are just some of the items available outside the STEM room, for a gold coin donation. Please come along and check it out, at this stage, potentially a couple of times each term, depending on the produce available. Thanks to Kristy Maher for this new innovation, something the children are very proud to make available.

P&F Update

A reminder to all parents in our community that we have a P&F meeting scheduled next Wednesday, 9 August at 6pm in the staffroom, all parents welcome. The draft agenda will be sent out to all P&F Executive and parent reps shortly in preparation for the meeting next week. We will also have an update from the subcommittee regarding the progress made with the Nature Play focus with P&F money this year.

Purchases can be made with a gold coin donation. Come and support our young farmers.


Science – Earth Science Education incursic

Camp Australia - Before and After School Care

Bookings for Your OSHC program are open. Registration is free for all families. We

recommend that all families register so if you ever need or want to attend, all you need to do is book your session as we'll already have all the documentation we need from you. You simply have to login and register through our Parent Portal, also available as a smartphone app, and start booking.

Cheaper Child Care for most families

From 10 July 2023, changes are coming to the Australian Government's Child Care Subsidy (CCS) that could make care cheaper for most families!




Apply for CCS through Centrelind via your MyGov Portal.

Update your child's CRN with Camp Australia.

Confirm your enrolment with Centrelink.

What you need to know:

- The maximum amount of CCS is increasing from 85% to 90%. Families earning up to \$80,000 will get the new maximum percentage of 90%.
- Families earning over 80,000 may get a subsidy starting from 90%. This will go down by 1% for each 5,000 of income they earn above 80,000. The CCS percentage they are entitled to depends on their family's income.
- The income limit for CCS is increasing to \$530,000.
- The OSHC hourly cap rate will increase from \$11.15 to \$12.02 (for school-aged children)
- Families earning below \$362,408 with more than one child aged 5 or under in care can get a higher rate of CCS for one or more of their children.
- From 10 July 2023, there are changes to Child Care Subsidy for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children. The changes mean they can get at least 36 hours of subsidy per fortnight, regardless of their family's income or activity level.

The **fathering**project Changing Children's Lives

The Important Role of Father Figures and Male Role Models

A father figure can be any positive male role model in a child's life. They can be sports coaches, teachers, uncles, grandparents or even your child's friend's dad.

Teenage friendships evolve, becoming more intricate and built on trust. As our children transition to secondary school, they might face challenges in maintaining and changing these relationships. It takes time for teenagers to find like-minded peers and form healthy, close bonds.

During this phase, teenagers explore their identities, emotions, and abilities, mingling with different groups. They may realise that some friendships or groups are no longer suitable for them, seeking out healthier connections.

As parents we need to support our teenagers by fostering open communication and understanding, letting them know that changes in friendships is normal during the teen years.

Help guide them as they navigate teenage friendships, helping them to recognise healthy relationships and make informed choices about their social circles.

Top Tips

1. Disagreements are normal: Remind them that friends sometimes have disagreements with each other – but you can always apologise and learn to forgive each other.

2. Have casual conversations: with your teen about friendships. Talk about topics such as; what makes a good friend, what is the difference between being popular and being a good friend, how to look after your friendships.

3. It's ok to outgrow friends: People change as they find new interests and people to hang out with as they mature.
